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Mayor's Corner



It is an honor to serve the citizens of Rockaway Township as Mayor. It is also an honor to go forward in the footsteps of Mayor Mike Dachisen. Winter Safety Reminders

Winter weather is here, and we would like to provide some safety tips for residents who wish to enjoy the many outdoor activities our area has to offer. Please be safe!!!

In General...

- Check the forecast. Weather can change quickly, so be prepared for anything. Carry backup clothing and supplies.
- Use the proper equipment. Be sure everything is in proper working condition before leaving home.
- Wear the proper attire. Use clothing and gear designed for the activity. Don't wear loose items that can be snagged or caught in equipment or machinery.
- Stay focused; commit 100% of your attention to the activity and the terrain. Rest when you are tired and hydrate often.
- Avoid alcohol. Don't drink before or during any outdoor activity. Alcohol cools the blood and decreases body temperature. It increases fatigue and impairs judgment.

Skiing & Snowboarding

- Stay on runs that are appropriate for your level of ability. Ski-run ratings can vary dramatically by area.
- Ski or snowboard in control at all times; maintain the ability to stop to avoid people or objects.
- Obey all posted signs and warnings. Do not cross ski area boundary lines.
- Do not ski or snowboard alone. Stay where others can see you in case you need assistance.

- Wear a helmet. Most ski areas require them; some rent them. Use goggles rather than sunglasses.
- Take breaks, stay well hydrated and avoid alcohol. Don't overdo it.

Sledding

- Never use roads unless they are blocked off from traffic.
- Avoid sledding directly into wooded areas, onto ice or into water.
- Be aware of sledders at the bottom and those returning up the hill. Wait until the path is clear before starting.

Ice Skating

- Skate in areas that have been approved and posted for ice skating.
- Avoid skating alone; stay where others can see you. Children should never skate unsupervised by adults.
- Remember that ice thickness is never consistent on lakes and ponds, and always beware of thin areas.
- Never skate after dark in dark areas.

Changes Coming to 2019 Recycling Schedule!

In order to eliminate an excessive number of holiday 'makeup days' for the 2019 calendar year, the Township is shifting the recycling schedule back one week. This will cause some overlap issues from the 2018 calendar. In an effort to accommodate all recycling routes during this transition period, the recycling schedule will be jumbled. Please see the calendar below for your pick up day. Starting January 14, 2019, normal recycling collections will resume for all routes. 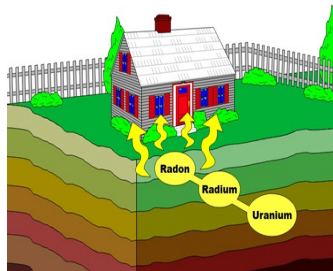

Free Radon Test Kits Through Division of Health

The Rockaway Township Division of Health is pleased to offer free radon test kits to Township residents. The test kits, available on a first come, first serve basis, were made possible through a cooperative grant and promotion with the New Jersey Department of Environmental Protection (NJDEP).

Radon is a colorless, odorless gas that is estimated to cause about 21,000 lung cancer deaths nationwide every year, and approximately 500 deaths each year in New Jersey. Northwest New Jersey experiences higher radon levels than some other parts of the country, so testing one's home is recommended.



There are simple ways to detect radon in your home, and the first step is a test from a vendor certified by the NJDEP. To obtain your free test kit, visit the Division of Health at the municipal building or call 973-983-2848 for more information.

Faesch House West Wing Reconstruction Completed

The Ford-Faesch House west wing reconstruction was completed in December 2018, with support from the Morris County Historical Preservation grant program. The original west wing was removed during the 1800s, likely scavenged for stone, leaving just a bay window. Through this project, the structure was rebuilt as it stood in the late eighteenth century.

The Historical Society, in partnership with Rockaway Township, has applied for and has been awarded several grants since the early 1990s, which have helped stabilize and improve the Faesch House structure. The reconstruction of the demolished wing, however, marks a dramatic step toward using the building for more interpretive purposes.

The west wing was reconstructed using materials and methods consistent with those of the late eighteenth century, and the results are stunning. Keep an eye on the Township website for a chance to visit the Faesch House during one of the several events the Historical Society holds throughout the year.

Public Works Winter Tips

Plowing Policies

With winter upon us, here are some tips to avoid snow plowing rage!

- Park cars off the street
- To minimize multiple shoveling commitments, don't clear driveways near the street until plowing is complete
- Don't shovel driveway snow onto the street – This is a violation of Township Ordinances and creates a hazard
- Don't shovel sidewalks onto street – this is also a violation of Township Ordinances and creates a hazard
- Per Township Ordinance, residents have 24 hours to remove snow from sidewalks in front of their home
- If you wish to file a claim for damage to your vehicle caused by Township equipment, you must have a police report

Avoid towing and impound charges: Township Ordinance 7-6.3(a,b) imposes temporary parking prohibition when snow has fallen and accumulated, at which point an emergency shall

be declared until the snow has ceased and the streets have been plowed sufficiently. Any unoccupied vehicles may be towed and impounded at the owner's expense. Please cooperate with plow crews by parking off the roads until plowing is complete. This will ensure safe, clean streets.

To report an ice condition, call 973-983-2891. To report a snow or ice related emergency off hours, please contact the Rockaway Township Police Department at 973-625-4000.

Street Lights

Street lights are maintained by Jersey Central Power and Light (JCP&L). As a courtesy, the Township can report a street light outage to the utility company if you provide us with the exact street address. Outages and street light issues may also be reported directly to JCP&L by dialing 800-662-3115 or by visiting www.firstenergycorp.com/service_requests/report-lighting-problem.html?form and completing their on-line form.

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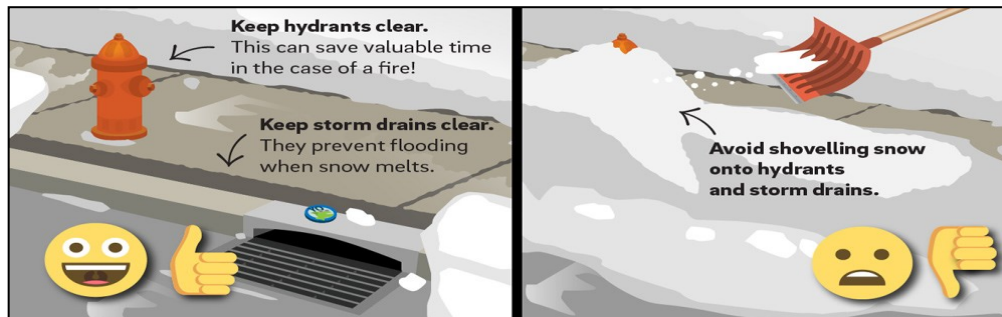
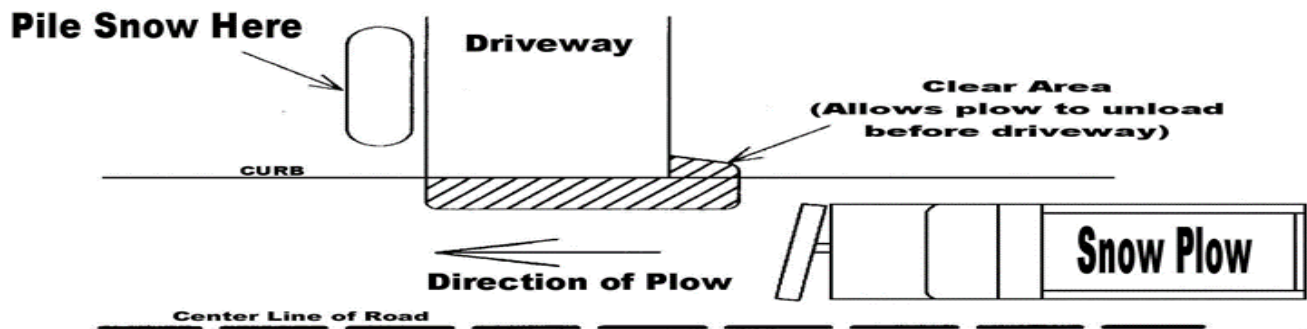
Proper Shoveling: Driveways, Sidewalks & Fire Hydrants

Inclement Weather/Holiday Collection

Should recycling collection be canceled due to inclement weather, your recycling will be collected the next scheduled pick up day. We will post cancelations of recycling pick up via the ReCollect App notifications system (see link above), on the Rockaway Township Facebook page, and through the Township website. *There is generally no make-up day* when a route is canceled due to inclement weather (exceptions may apply per the discretion of Rockaway Township Recycling). However, if your collection day falls on a holiday, there is *always a make-up day* – please refer to the 2017 Recycling calendar to see collection dates (see above to learn how to get your personalized collection calendar).

Christmas Tree Pick Up

The Township will offer curbside

collection of Christmas trees twice in the coming weeks. Please place trees curbside by 6:00am on Tuesday, January 22 or Wednesday, February 4. Recycling crews will travel the entire town during the week following each of these dates, collecting trees.

There will be no designated day for collection, so please have your tree to the curb by the dates indicated above to ensure pick up. Trees should be bare and free from all decorations, lights and tinsel, and should not be contained in plastic bags. Please keep trees free from frozen snow banks, as trees frozen in the snow will not be collected. If these curbside collection weeks are not convenient for you, we will also accept Christmas trees in the brush pile at the McVeigh Recycling yard during normal operating hours.

Senior Exercise!

Residents are reminded that the Department of Community Services offers Adult/Senior Exercise classes at the municipal building as follows:

- Healthy Bones classes are held Monday mornings from 10:00am - 11:30am. The entire session is \$25.
- Yoga classes are held Tuesday mornings from 10:00am - 10:45am, and from 11:00am - 11:45am. The eight week session costs \$25.
- Arthritis Foundation Exercise Program classes are held Friday mornings from 10:30am - 11:30am. The course is free to residents and \$25 for non-residents.

It's Not Too Late to Prevent the Flu! Tips for Staying Healthy this Season

The single best way to prevent seasonal flu is to get each year, but good health habits like covering your cough and washing your hands often can help stop the spread of germs and prevent respiratory illnesses like the flu. There also are that can be used to treat and prevent flu. The tips and resources below will help you learn about steps you can take to protect yourself and others from flu and help stop the spread of germs.

Get vaccinated

Flu activity usually peaks between December and March, and the best way to protect yourself, your family and your co-workers is to get a flu shot. Flu vaccine is still widely available through venues like physicians, hospitals and pharmacies. Though the Rockaway Township Division of Health completed its series of flu clinics in November, there is a limited supply of vaccine left and residents may contact the Division of Health at 973-983-2848 to inquire about a flu shot.

Avoid close contact

Avoid close contact with people who are sick. When you are sick, keep your

distance from others to protect them from getting sick, too.

Stay home when you are sick

If possible, stay home from work, school and other activities when you are sick. This will help prevent spreading illness to others.

Cover your mouth and nose

Cover your mouth and nose with a tissue when coughing or sneezing. It may prevent those around you from getting sick. Flu and other serious respiratory illnesses, like whooping cough and severe acute respiratory syndrome (SARS), are spread by cough, sneezing or unclean hands.

Wash your hands

Washing your hands often will help protect you from germs. Remember to wash for at least 20 seconds, create a good lather and wash the back of your hands. If soap and water are not available, use an alcohol-based hand rub.

Avoid touching eyes, nose or mouth

Germs are often spread when a person touches something that is contaminated with germs and then touches his or her eyes, nose or mouth.

The Lost Art of... Handwashing

December 4-10 was National Handwashing Awareness Week, but when isn't it a good idea to bring attention to proper handwashing? The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention reminds us that handwashing is the number one way to prevent the spread of communicable disease. You can help yourself and others stay healthy by washing your hands often, especially at these key times:

- Before, during and after preparing food
- Before eating food
- When caring for someone who is sick
- When treating a cut or wound
- After using the toilet
- After changing diapers
- After touching an animal or animal waste
- After touching garbage
- After blowing your nose, coughing or sneezing
